Focus: Translating written text into speech



Scenario



Two friends, one Lithuanian, the other English, scrolling on their phones. The Lithuanian comes across an interesting article about a music festival: A: *This is interesting. I'm reading an article about*

Introduction

A. Music Festivals

Pair-work

Task 1: Reading and Note-taking

Team-work

Form teams of 4. Choose a name for your team. Choose a team leader, and a rapporteur (reporter). Assign a letter to each member: A, B, C, D.

A. Note-taking and summarising

Group-work

Re-organise yourselves such that A students are together in Group A, B students are together in Group B, C students are together in Group C, and D students are together in Group D.

You each have one of four articles to translate and summarise.

Work alone: Read your article and translate it, making notes about it, in the form of an information list, including why it was in the news. Task 2: Mediating a text by translating and summarising it

Team-work

Reform your original teams

Use your notes, and without referring to the original article, tell the other members of your new group the story, including why it was in the news. Remember to *mediate* the translation. It's not a sustained monologue, it's a dialogue, with you interacting with your listeners, and the listeners *actively* listening not passively.
